- Speed



- Work



- Color



- Show



SPEED BREEDS

- Stamina
(Thoroughbred
and Standardbred)
- Sprinters
(Quarter Horse)



WORK BREEDS

- Pull large loads
- Carry extremely heavy loads



COLOR BREEDS

- Solely dictated by color and patterns



SHOW BREEDS

- Selection based on “showy” qualities and “stylish” characteristics



QUARTER HORSE

- American Breed
- Excels at sprinting short distances~ 1/4 mile race
- Breed Characteristics: Stock Type, Halter Type Racing Type and Hunter Type
- Small, short refined head
- Strong, well-muscled body broad chest and powerful round hindquarters
- Come in nearly all colors



PAINT HORSE

- Combination of color and conformation
- Dam or Sire must be registered with Paint Horse Association, Quarter Horse Association or Jockey Club (Thoroughbreds)
- Categories: Regular (with color)
Solid Paint-Bred (without color)



- Uses: Western Pleasure, Reining, Western Events and some English in Hunt Seat and Show Jumping

AMERICAN SADDLEBRED HORSE

- Originated in United States
- Gaited horses and high stepping
- Docile and intelligent, high endurance
- Utilized during Civil War
- Used for pleasure, stock and harness horses
- Height ~ 15-16 hands high
- Color ~ bay, brown, chestnut gray, golden or black



ARABIAN HORSE

- Originated in Arabia
- Developed in a desert climate
- Forms cooperative relationship with humans
- Good Natured, quick to learn and willing to please
- High Spirit and alert
- Versatile breed ~ endurance
- Height ~ 14.2 – 15.2 hands
- Carry their tail high and dished face, long arched neck and short back



MORGAN HORSE

- One of the earliest breeds developed in US
- Cavalry horses during Civil War
- Influenced by American Quarter Horses, Tennessee Walker, and Standardbred.
- Versatility ~ English and Western Events
- Height ~ 14-16 Hands High
- Known for pleasing temperament, docile, and longevity
- Bay, Brown, Chestnut or Black



THOROUGHBRED HORSE

- Originated in Great Britain
- Originated from multiple breeds: Arabian, Quarter Horses, Standardbred, and Morgan
- Height 15~17 hands
- Primarily bred for racing
- Come in every solid coat color
- Have a fast metabolism



APPALOOSA HORSE

- American Breed
- Known for its colorful spotted coat pattern
- Mottled Skin/Sclera
- Striped Hooves
- Coat Patterns
 - Blanket
 - Blanket with spots
 - Roan
 - Roan Blanket
 - Roan Blanket with Spots
 - Solid



PONY OF AMERICA

- Originated in the United States
- Cross between an Arabian/Appaloosa and Shetland Pony
- Pleasure horse used for young riders
- Have Loud Appaloosa Coloring
- Mottled Skin/Sclera
- Stand between 46~56 inches in height



PERCHERON HORSE

- Originated in France
- Favorite with farmers and teamsters to move freight
- Color is primarily black or dapple grey
- Height ~ 16.1 – 16.3 hands
- Known for strength, temperament, longevity, and willingness to work
- Used for Special Attractions and farm work
